
25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DIVISION OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA

During the seminar 'Czechoslovakia; From Velvet Revolution to Velvet Divorce'

TIRANA - On the occasion of 25th anniversary of the division of Czechoslovakia, the Embassies of Czech and Slovak Republics in Tirana in cooperation with the Albanian Institute for International Studies organized a seminar under the headline "Czechoslovakia: From Velvet Revolution to Velvet Divorce" on Wednesday with the main speakers Mr. Slavomír Michalek, Director of the Institute of History of the Slovak Academy of Sciences and Mr. Pavel Mucke, Vice-Director of the Institute of Contemporary History of the Czech Academy of Sciences.

The seminar was greeted by the Ambassador of the Czech Republic to Tirana, Mr Jaroslav Ludva and the Deputy Ambassador of the Slovak Republic to Tirana, Mr Milan Selecky, who among others noted that the relations between the two countries are excellent, even better than before the 'divorce'.

Besides many aspects covering history, politics, economy, demography of their 100 years of being a state, it was noted that a big plus for the calm and peaceful division of Czechoslovakia into two countries was the fact that they did not have any border problems.

The speakers pointed out that both countries are members of the European Union and NATO, and they were proud of those achievements. In the meantime along with Poland and Hungary they are members of the Visegrad Group in whose frame, as they said, they have a fruitful cooperation beneficial for the four countries.

In the political aspect the 'velvet' division was totally different from what happened in the 90s in the former Soviet Union and especially in former Yugoslavia whose dismantling process was characterized by bloody wars with a tragic aftermath on the people and the respective countries. ple reacted towards Albania's condemnation of the invasion of their country by the Soviet Union led Warsaw Pact troops in on August 20, 1968 to crack down on reformist trends in Prague and its official withdrawal of the Warsaw Treaty. The answer was that such a move was positively appreciated by citizens. And as history has shown although the Soviet Union's action successfully halted the pace of reform in Czechoslovakia at that time, it had unintended consequences for the unity of the communist bloc afterwards.
